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## Building an activist Parliament

“The ANC Caucus believes that an activist Parliament will concretely bring into reality government’s comprehensive plans, which are deeply rooted in spiritual and moral values...”

The African National Congress has committed itself to an activist Parliament that must put the interest of all the people of South Africa first and strictly perform its constitutional functions. Such a Parliament, according to the Chief Whip of the ANC, Dr. Mathole Motshekga, must not only be seen on television, but must practically be visible among the people. An activist Parliament must have Members that use Parliamentary Constituency Offices as springboards for community outreach work, not as resting places. It must be a Parliament that ensures the speedy rollout of basic services to people by holding the Executive accountable without fear or favour. In his response to the National Assembly debates on his State of the Nation Address on Wednesday, President Jacob Zuma reaffirmed the importance of having an institution that not only has teeth, but is able to bite too. Responding to ANC Member of Parliament Thaba Mufamadi on the matter of an activist

Parliament, the President emphasised:

“Regardless of differences as political parties, I believe that we have a common goal, which is to make South Africa a great country. We take all contributions to the debate in that spirit. We have noticed too that this House will seriously hold the Executive accountable.

“As Hon. Thaba Mofumadi said, this will be a “strong activist Parliament”

“As the national executive, we welcome increased oversight to assist us in achieving our target of effective efficient government. We will work harder and smarter and the South African people will be the beneficiaries of this constructive robust role of Parliament”.

The ANC Caucus believes that an activist Parliament will concretely bring into reality government’s comprehensive plans, which are deeply rooted in spiritual and moral values that the ANC cherishes and believes are the prerequisite for building cohesive, caring and sustainable communities.

# Strengthening our Parliamentary work

**A**NC Members of Parliament deployed in both Houses of Parliament, the National Assembly (NA) and the National Council of Provinces (NCOP), met on Thursday (11 June) for an ordinary meeting of the national Caucus to reflect on the work of its cadres and to plan for the week ahead.

The meeting received and deliberated on various reports relating to; amongst others, the work of the ANC Study Groups, the debate on the President's State of the Nation Address, the deployment of ANC MPs to various Parliamentary Constituency Offices across the country and the appointment of MPs to the positions of Parliamentary Whips in the NA. The meeting noted the high level and quality team put together by the organisation to participate in the National Assembly's debate on the State of the Nation Address.

Caucus expressed satisfaction with the level of preparedness of all its MPs who participated in the debate.

Members of Parliament have a collective responsibility to the people of South Africa to ensure that the commitments made by the President in his State of the Nation Address are fully implemented.

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On the work of Study Groups, the meeting noted that the initial meetings of committees have taken place, to design and discuss the political approach of

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the ANC in all parliamentary structures.

Study Groups are the organisation's political structures in Parliament and their input seeks to add value and strengthen the work of the committees of Parliament. The meeting reflected on the process of deploying MPs to various Parliamentary Constituency Offices, also known as PCOs.

It emphasised the importance of speeding up the conclusion of this process to ensure that the first constituency work period of this new term of Parliament, scheduled for July, is not adversely affected.

Caucus has committed itself to finalise the deployment to PCOs of all its 299 MPs in both Houses by the end of June 2009.

The meeting received a briefing from the Secretary General of the ANC Youth League, Vuyiswa Tulelo, on the League's activities and plans throughout the month of June, which is traditionally known as Youth Month.

The Secretary General's input to Caucus came a day after the National Assembly held a Youth Day commemoration debate,

themed: Celebrating a Vibrant Youth Voice.

The interest of the youth of this country and the daily challenges they face, particularly in the current socioeconomic environment, are issues that must strongly feature on the agenda of the Caucus and Parliament.

Caucus was briefed by the Chief Whip on the state of the Caucus, including the appointments of a number of MPs to the positions of Parliamentary Whips.

The appointments follow our announcement recently of Chairpersons of Committees and are part of a process of capacitating the Fourth Parliament to fully dispense its functions.

Parliamentary Whips are responsible for the political management of the organisation within the institution.

They are custodians of party discipline and form part of the Whippers, a structure headed by the Chief Whip of the Majority Party.

The work of Whips for this current term of Parliament is crucial to our endeavour to realise that which we have committed ourselves to: an activist Parliament that is uncompromising in the execution of its constitutional mandate and that regularly accounts to the people of South Africa.

The meeting wished these appointees well and assured them of their full support in the execution of their duties.
